### **Universal PreKindergarten (UPK)**

- UPK includes the following programs in MVWSD:
  - Transitional Kindergarten
  - California State Preschool Program (CSPP)
- Implementing UPK will require that the District to consider a variety of factors in order to continue to expand TK and support Preschool
- The District has a three phase plan
  - Phase 1: Movement of TK and Preschool Classes (Spring/Summer 2023)
  - Phase 2: Adoption of new PK/TK curriculum (Fall 2023)
  - Phase 3: Determine the Future of Preschool
    - Including the possibility of District supplemented full day classrooms and location of additional TK classrooms (Spring/Summer 2024)
      - District contracted with Hanover Research to conduct a Kindergarten Readiness Data analysis as part of this process



# Preschool and TK Programming

#### **MVWSD Preschool**

- MVWSD operates a half day California State Preschool Program (CSPP)
- MVWSD receives funding from the state for half day preschool (3 hours)
- Enrollment in state preschool is income based except for families residing in the Castro neighborhood and those with students with Individualized Education Programs (IEP)
  - Castro Neighborhood families qualify for "free-preschool for all 4 year olds regardless of income rule"
- While the District is not contracted with the CDE to provide Full-day State Preschool, due to parent demand, the District has added an extended day program (8:00 am 3:00 pm) for Part-Day State Preschool eligible families at a reduced rate as well as some full fee spaces for families that do not meet income requirements
- The fees the District collects are below market rate and the District does contribute funds to offset the cost of the full day program

#### **MVWSD Preschool**

• For the 2022-23 School year, Preschool had 186 available space allocated as follow:

Part Day: 126

Full Day: 60

Full Fee: 10

- Preschool enrolled at total of 147 students
  - 37% of students were 3 years old
  - 63% were four years old
  - The majority of the 39 empty spots were in part day classes (28/39)
- Only 5 families enrolled were full fee families
- Only 3 students enrolled were eligible for TK
- Four students enrolled had IEPs
- Preschool enrollment has seen a decline due to the availability of TK
  - Parents may choose to enroll in preschool or TK for age eligible students

#### Preschool for 2023-24

 For the 2023-24 school year Preschool has 176 total spaces available allocated as follows:

Part Day: 96

Full Day: 80

Full Fee: 10

 The state preschool class moving from Graham to Theuerkauf will shift from a half day to a full day class thus reducing the total number of available spaces and increasing the District contribution to preschool

### **Transitional Kindergarten (TK)**

- Education Code section 48000(c) requires any school district operating a Kindergarten to also provide a TK program for all 4-year-old children by 2025–26.
- All children whose fourth birthday occurs by September 1 will have access to TK at a school district as a quality learning experience the year before Kindergarten.
- In 2022–23, children turning five between September 2 and February 2\* are eligible for TK. The age by which children are eligible for TK will expand over the next three years as follows:
  - In the 2023–24 school year, children who will turn five between September 2 and April 2\* are eligible for TK.
  - In the 2024–25 school year, children who turn five between
     September 2 and June 2\* are eligible for TK.
  - In the 2025–26 school year, and in each school year thereafter,
     children who will turn four by September 1\* are eligible for TK.

#### **Transitional Kindergarten**

- Currently the District has 5 TK classes all located at Theuerkauf Elementary
  - At the start of the year the District planned for 6 classes based off of spring enrollment although many families opted to not come in fall
  - We currently have 99 students enrolled which is a class size average of 20 students per class with one teacher and one instructional assistant
  - Seven students have IEPs
  - Twenty-eight are SocioEconomically Disadvantaged
  - Forty students are English Learners

### **Transitional Kindergarten**

- The District is expanding to eight classes in 2023-24 at five different sites in order to offer more choice for parents and support consistency in instruction at sites that are struggling with emerging readers:
  - Theuerkauf 2
  - Monta Loma 2
  - Castro 1
  - Mistral 1
  - Imai 2 co-taught classes
- Current projected enrollment for 2023-24 is 152 students
  - (3.5 million dollar unfunded mandate).
- Classes at Mistral and Theuerkauf will have 2 instructional assistants to accommodate the lack of bathrooms in the



# Data Review and Analysis

#### **Data Review**

- Phase 3 of the District's UPK plan includes: Determining the Future of Preschool
- Initial data reviews done by MVWSD staff indicated that students coming out of the district's preschool programs are not necessarily performing any better than students who did not participate in the district's preschool programs, particularly in early literacy measures and academic achievement.
- To further understanding about these outcomes, the District partnered with Hanover Research to further analyze its early childhood data in order to understand the current state of kindergarten/ elementary readiness

#### **Research Questions Posed to Hanover**

- 1. How does kindergarten/elementary readiness vary based on demographic characteristics (e.g., gender, race/ethnicity, socioeconomic status, disability status, English Learner etc.)?
- 2. How does kindergarten/elementary readiness vary based on previous early childhood educational experiences and environments?











# 3rd Grade i-Ready Reading Scores Preschool compared to All students




# 3rd Grade i-Ready Reading Scores TK compared to All Students




## 3rd Grade i-Ready Reading Scores - SED Students who had Preschool compared to All SED




# 3rd Grade i-Ready Scores SED Students who had TK compared to All SED Students

# 3rd Grade i-Ready Scores - EL students who had TK compared to All ELs








# 3rd Grade CAASPP Reading Scores-EL Students who had TK Compared to All ELs




### 3rd Grade CAASPP Reading Scores - SED Students who had Preschool Compared to All SED




# 3rd Grade CAASPP Reading - SED Students who had TK compared to All SED Students





#### Data Pull Reveals that in 2022

- 48 percent of the students who participated in TK or Preschool were SED
- 63 percent of the students were Latino
  - compared to 11 percent from non-district programs
- Students who participated in MVWSD's TK program performed better than their Preschool peers in Kindergarten
- TK students performed on par with their non-MVWSD peers

### **Findings from Hanover**

Male students, economically disadvantaged students, Hispanic/Latino students, special education students, and English learners were significantly more likely to participate in a district run preschool or transitional kindergarten program versus a non-district program.

- In the 2022 school year, 48 percent of kindergarten students who had participated in a district run preschool or transitional kindergarten program in the year prior were economically disadvantaged. In comparison, only ten percent of kindergarten students who had participated in a non-district program in the year prior were economically disadvantaged.
- Similarly, in 2022, 63 percent of prior district run program students were Hispanic compared to only 11 percent of prior non-district program students.
- When comparing only district run transitional kindergarten to district run preschool, kindergarten students were more likely to have been in transitional kindergarten versus preschool in the year prior if they were Asian or White, non-SPED, or non-economically disadvantaged

### **Findings from Hanover**

Economically disadvantaged students, English learner students, and special education students were much less likely to be on or above benchmark on elementary readiness assessments than their counterparts. The most notable examples of these were on i-Ready exams, where these student groups were 30 to 50 percentage points lower than their direct counterparts.

Students who participated in district run transitional kindergarten the year prior to kindergarten generally performed better on assessments during kindergarten than those who participated in district run preschool the year prior to kindergarten. This is true across most exams and school years but is especially notable in English Phonemic Awareness, High Frequency Words, and ELPAC.

Students who participated in district run transitional kindergarten the year prior to kindergarten generally tested below students who participated in a non-district preschool programs. Kindergarten students who participated in transitional kindergarten in MVWSD met expectations on the i-Ready reading assessment on par with non-district preschool programs in 2019 (83 % versus 85%), but by 2022 transitional kindergarten students were significantly below non-district preschool students (68% versus 87%).

#### **Recommendation from Hanover**

Continue with plans to expand the transitional kindergarten programs within MVWSD and encourage parents to enroll students in transitional kindergarten rather than traditional preschool when possible. Hanover found that students who enrolled in TK performed better on metrics of early-elementary readiness than those who enrolled in traditional district preschool. Encouraging parents who may enroll their students in traditional preschool within MVWSD to enroll their students in TK may improve the elementary readiness of their students. Efforts should be made to ensure that parents of young children are aware of these benefits and availability. Awareness campaigns should target low-income families, ESL families, and families of children with developmental disabilities.



- Preschool and TK are targeting different populations.
  - Preschool tends to enroll students who more likely to be Latino, EL, SED and SPED
- Preschool operates many classes on a part time basis due to the CSPP contract
  - Moving to full time could possibly further encroach on the budget and reduce the number of offerings for students

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- Recent reports indicate that California has 30,000 fewer four-year-olds enrolled in preschool and TK than expected.
- The Santa Clara County's Local Early Education Planning Council (LPC) Needs Assessment Report indicates that there are hundreds more preschool spaces in the county than there are children.
  - Mountain View 1,400 empty preschool slots
  - Sunnyvale 2,800 empty preschool slots
  - Palo Alto 4,800 empty preschool slots

- Adding 2 TK classes to the Castro / Mistral campus will likely help MVWSD to reach more families who are in need
  - This will reduce the number of students enrolling in Preschool
- As TK expands to include all 4 year olds preschool enrollment will likely decrease or become a program for students ages 2yrs. 9 months - 3+ years
- MVWSD will be exploring a possible curriculum adoption that could potentially link our early years

### Policy questions for later...

- Preschool will continue to experience declining enrollment as a result of UPK. Does the Board wish to continue Preschool?
- Although preschool encroaches on the budget, considering the population that is supported by preschool does the Board see this as a quality first step to addressing the achievement gap?
